out homes from commercial property?

A. Yes. This sales ratio study is done separately for several types of property, whether a home, commercial or retail, vacant land or industrial, then all lumped together for the overall total. It is difficult, if not impossible, in these uncertain economic times, to really know what all property is worth. With vacant lots, for example, you may have a bank sell one lot in a subdivision for \$5,000.00 and then an individual may sell the adjacent lot for \$10,000. Again, based on actual sales, the Tax Assessor's office has been very consistent. As the number of sales continues to increase, values will hopefully be much easier to establish in the future.

**Q. If the county property values continue to go down as they did this past year by 10%, does that mean that our property taxes will also go down?**

A. Not necessarily. Our property taxes have been reduced a small amount over each of the past three years, but we will not be able to continue that decrease if our property values continue to fall. What

I have successfully tried to do the past few years is not increase property taxes, but at the same time, try to hold close to our current revenue numbers.

**Q. Will it be possible for our property taxes to continue to decrease as they have in the past few years?**

A. It is not likely unless our business and residential growth increases dramatically. We have cut our government cost by watching our expenses and at the same time have continued to reduce our work force primarily by attrition. However, we cannot continue this and still provide the services that our taxpayers have come to expect and demand.

We operate with one of the very lowest property tax rates in the state. When you do that there is not much room to handle additional expenses when the cost of gasoline, diesel, gravel, asphalt, vehicles and office supplies continue to rise despite our recession.

The Elected Officials and all county employees wish for you all a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

how the different companies share and lease service from each other. I have also learned that you can only shove so much sewage through a sewer pipe of a given size. Don't take the "Canned answer" any longer. Make your dissatisfaction known where it will be heard. The names and addresses are available online IF you will take the time and search at off peak times. Also "Squeaking wheels" do eventually get grease. Call Customer Service and don't accept the usual "\$15 Credit" offer they will make. If you are not getting what you are paying for tell them and demand better service. If the representative you are speaking with does not have authority to help you then ask for their boss and/or the "Customer Loyalty" Department.

I would not complain about the monthly subscription fee IF I were getting the service I pay for. I did not complain for years until the service level dropped to unac-
